

Higher Education in Norway – 2018 data

- 280 000 students (all Ministries)
- 259 000 students (Min. of Ed. and Research)
 - of whom 40 500 (15 %) at private HEIs
 - 60 % are female
 - + 10 774 at ph.d. level (2017)
- 48 127 graduates (B + M)
 - 31 429 bachelor or similar + 118 short cycle
 - 16 580 master or similar
- 38 400 staff (of whom 15 750 qual. academic and 7 500 recruitment posts, incl. post-doc)

- **Quality measures HE**
- Centres of Excellence in Education (SFU)

- since 2010, at present 8 centres. New call 2019

- Student Barometer since 2014, a national survey of ALL 2nd and 5th year HE students on perceived educational quality
- 2016, spring *revised regulations* concerning quality of studies (tightening of requirements for the master's and ph.d. levels)
- 2017 NOKUT's supplementary regulations concerning requirements for (re)accreditation of study programmes revised
 - both in force February 2017

Aims of White Paper no. 16 (2016–2017) Culture for Quality in Higher Education

- More engaging studies and more ambitious goals for student achievement
- Students included in academic community
- Clear aims and streamlining of education programmes
- Varied teaching and assessment methodologies
- Better co-operation with business and industry
- High pedagogical competence of academic staff
- Better recognition of teaching and learning

Four main approaches to improve quality in higher education



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White Paper: Long-term plan for Research and Higher Education 2019–2028 (LTP)

Overall aims:

- Enhanced competitiveness and innovation capacity in Norwegian business and industry
- Tackling major societal challenges
- Developing research communities of outstanding quality



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LTP: Thematic priorities and investment plans Thematic priorities:

- Oceans
- Climate, environment, and clean energy
- Public sector innovation for better and more efficient services
- Enabling and industrial technologies
- Civic protection and social cohesion in a globalised world

Spending commitments 2019–2022 in three investment plans:

- NOK 800 million on new technologies
- NOK 450 million on R&D supporting innovative and adaptive businesses
- NOK 250 million on improving quality in higher education
 85 million in 2019

New funding scheme from 2018

Based on Culture for Quality, and Long-term Plan

"programme for student-active learning" :

- 40 mill. NOK in 2018 call for projects that will develop, explore, evaluate and make use of student-active learning methods and assessment methods encouraging learning
- Open to all fields and disciplines
- Projects should relate to whole study programmes, or major courses or modules
- Max. NOK 5 mill. per project 3-year period
 next call in 2020


