

Implementation of the Key Commitment: Qualifications Frameworks

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Overview

Key Commitment: a three-cycle system compatible with the overarching frameworks of the EHEA and first and second cycle degrees scaled by ECTS

Thematic areas:

- Self-certification of the national qualifications framework to the overarching Qualifications Framework of the EHEA (main focus of the work)
- Implementation of the ECTS User's Guide
- Short cycle higher education
- Multiple purposes and the use of the qualifications frameworks by stakeholders
- Relationship between the qualifications frameworks and quality assurance

Overview

- Three meetings
- Two hands-on workshops on self-certification
- Conference on the implementation of the ECTS Users' Guide
- Two PLAs:
 - NQFs
 - multiple purposes of qualifications frameworks and stakeholders
- Seminar on linking qualifications frameworks and quality assurance

Main outcomes and some observations

- Increased awareness and understanding
- Importance of the implementation of the National Qualifications Framework
- Key role of the stakeholders in the preparation as well as the implementation of the Framework
- Co-operation with National Correspondents for Qualifications Frameworks, (Council of Europe)
- Co-operation with the European Qualifications Framework (European Commission)
- Link with other policy areas, notably quality assurance and recognition

Further work needed

- Understanding the role of qualifications frameworks in education: promoting access, recognition and comparability, the use and the role of learning outcomes
- Availability of easily accessible up-to-date information on:
 - self-certification criteria and procedures a well as self-certification reports
- Lack of peer review of the self-certification reports
 - Participation of international experts in the preparation of the report is important
 - Peer review of the report is important for clarity, transparency and credibility

Further work needed

- Further coherent co-operation between the two overarching frameworks:
 QF-EHEA and European Qualifications Framework
- Good practice and experience when it comes to the peer review of the referencing/self-certification reports
- Thematic work
- Information
