### Who we are?

- Project period 2023-2026
- Budget: ~3.5 million euros











## The support initiative is aimed at...

- Promoting and supporting the exchange of experience and good practices among current and future Erasmus Mundus consortia.
- Enhancing networking opportunities and mutual support for various stakeholders.
- Developing a collaborative structure for the community to complement existing initiatives.
- Evaluating the impact of the Erasmus Mundus programme and showcasing its achievements.
- Building broader interest in the Erasmus Mundus programme.



## Primary target audience

Higher education professionals involved in implementing Erasmus Mundus programmes at their institutions including:

- Consortia coordinators and partners overseeing Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters and Erasmus Mundus Design Measures programmes.
- Academic staff responsible for programme coordination and curriculum development.
- Administrative staff involved in programme design and delivery, including student recruitment, and mobility support matters (faculty and department/programme level).
- Administrative staff involved in overseeing and coordinating the institution's Erasmus Mundus portfolio (central level).



## Secondary target audience

A wide range of stakeholders involved or interested in the Erasmus Mundus programme:

- Potential applicants including higher education institutions and their staff members interested in developing an Erasmus Mundus Joint Master or Erasmus Mundus Design Measure programme.
- Dedicated associations and university networks (e.g., Erasmus Mundus Alumni Association, ESAA, EMACT).
- National Agencies and offices for Erasmus+ in Programme and Partner countries.
- Other interested higher education institutions and their alliances or networks involved in joint degree programmes or other types of transnational cooperation partnerships.



## What kind of support?

- Facilitate **peer learning and exchanges** between the existing Erasmus Mundus consortia through a range of activities:
  - An online Community of Practice platform.
  - Three annual large-scale onsite conferences.
  - Four thematic/regional hybrid seminars.
- Celebrate the Erasmus Mundus programme's **20th anniversary** with an **impact study** and an **anniversary conference in Brussels.**



## What kind of support?

- Organise two study visits to showcase and promote good practices.
- Host **four worldwide webinars** to raise awareness about the Erasmus Mundus program among potential applicants.
- Facilitate the development of newly-selected Erasmus Mundus grant holders through a mentoring scheme.
- Develop case studies, articles, and other communication materials to highlight the successes of Erasmus Mundus.




# CONTEXT OF JOINT DEGREES IMPLEMENTATION



As defined in the European Approach for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmes, a 'joint degree' is a single document awarded by HEIs offering a joint programme and nationally acknowledged as the recognised award of the joint programme.

#### Different types of joint degrees


Type A Joint Degree Type B Joint Degree per track Type D Joint Degree Combination

### MAIN CHALLENGES



#### 1. LEGISLATIVE BARRIERS

- 1.1 Some national legislations do not allow JDs
- 1.2 Incompatible legal and technical requirements at national level
- 1.3 Lack of common guidance
- 1.4 Undefined & overlapping terminology



#### 2. INSTITUTIONAL BARRIERS

- 2.1 Incompatible internal regulations
- 2.2 Institutional resistance
- 2.3 Time- & resource-consuming



#### 3. RECIPIENT'S BARRIERS

- 3.1 Employers lack the knowledge/awareness of JDs as opposed to well-established national degrees
- 3.2 Students do not value JDs the same way they value double/multiple ones





### Recommendations

- Advocate for adaptation of legislation to allow the award of JDs for HEI to be able to be flexible and autonomous in their decision, including to uptake the European Approach.
- Strengthen collaborating and **exchange of good practices** among countries with limited and as well as high regulatory boundaries.
- Provide a space for dialogue between HEIs and their respective national authorities; facilitate the identification and exchange of good practices among national authorities.
- Enhance awareness among HEI about the different options to implement JD, incl. through the European Approach.
- **Provide HEIs with clear guidelines** on how to interpret the unclear rules on JD implementation and the measures to adapt to them.
