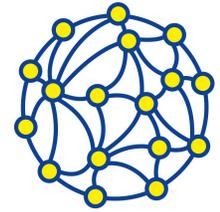

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Purpose of the QA Framework

- Now starting phase of European Universities, setting up internal QA, possibilities to experiment
- At some point joint provision is likely to be subject to external QA (e.g. accreditation of joint programmes, institutional reviews)
- Multiple, potentially contradictory, less suitable external QA procedures could become problematic
- **Ultimate aim** is that alliances can be evaluated with 1 European QA Framework and 1 QA procedure

European Universities



Evaluation criteria

- **Criteria** describe what is expected from a fully developed European University
- **Reference points** indicate for each criterion relevant elements of the European Universities Initiative call
- Evaluation of the **stage of development** allows to adapt expectations to reality of current early stage

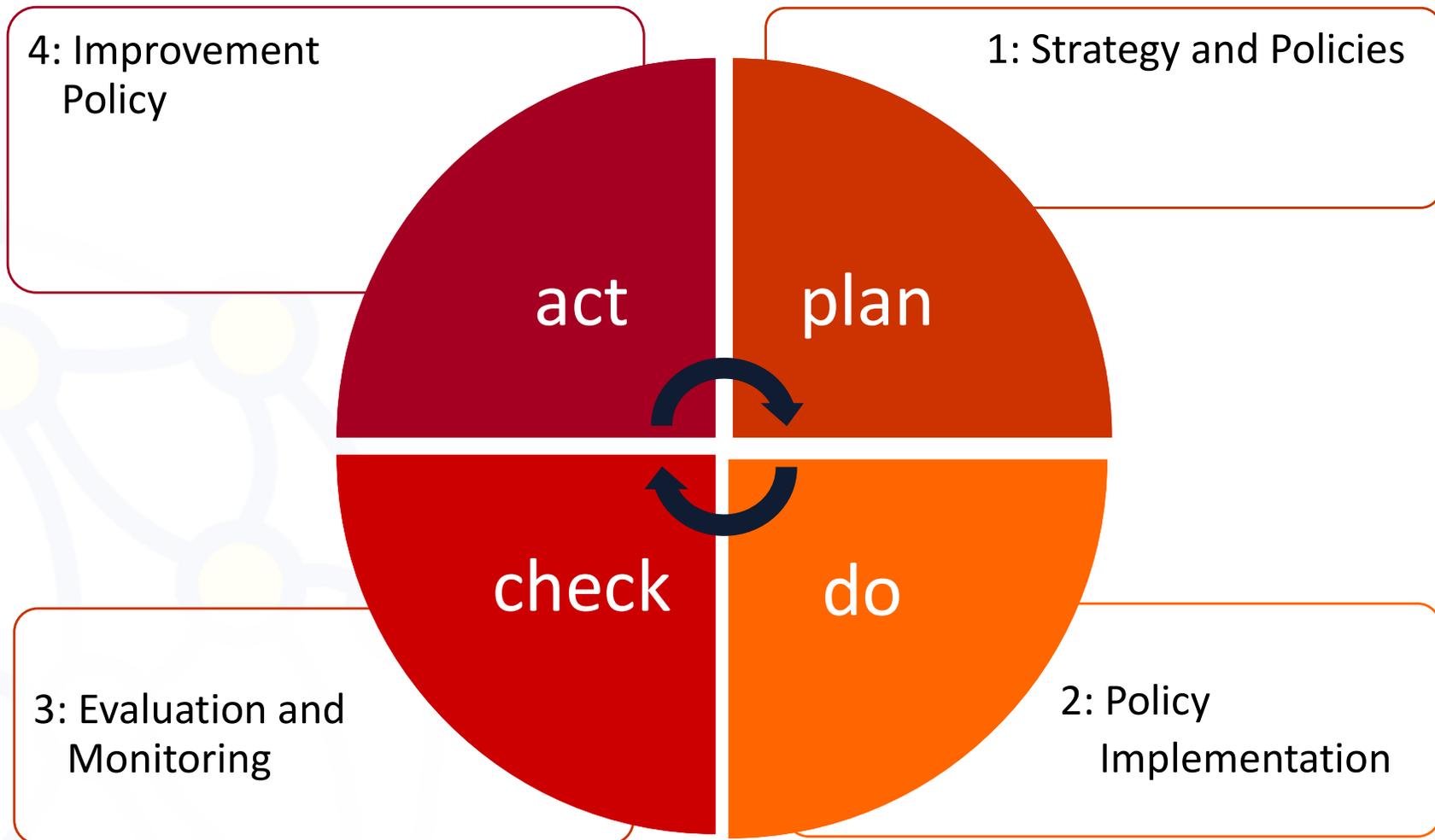


Criteria based on evaluation questions

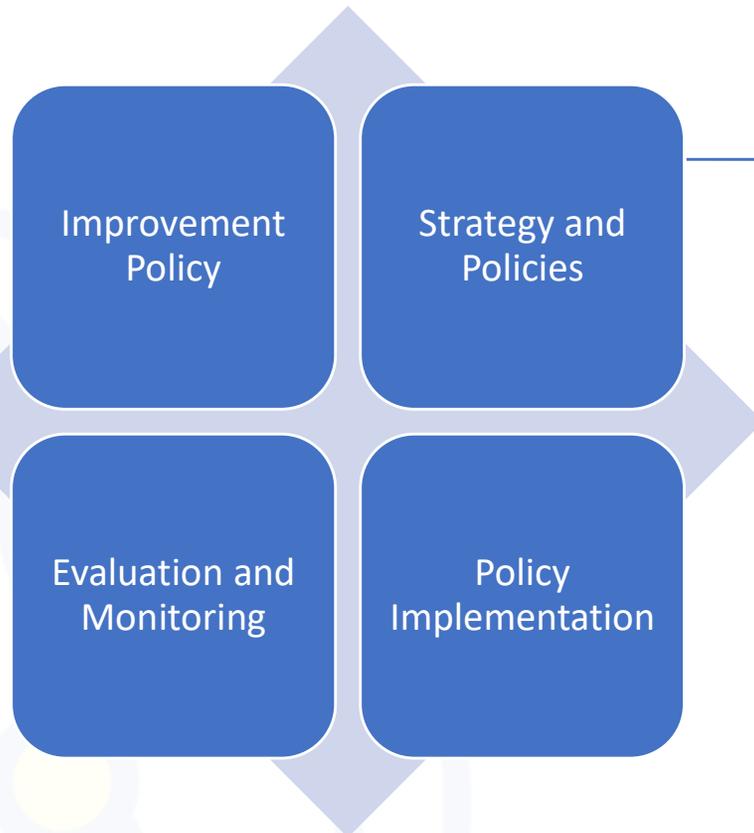
- What is the European University's **vision** on the quality of its education and, where possible, the links to research, innovation and service to society?
- How will the European University **realise** its vision?
- How does the European University **monitor** to what extent its vision is actually realised?
- How is the European University working on **improvement**?
- How is the quality of the European University's provision assured in an internationally accepted manner (**ESG**)?



Criteria follow PDCA cycle



Criteria and reference points



4 reference points for each criterion, e.g. for Strategy and Policies:

The European University's strategy and policies enable the realisation of an inter-university 'campus' which assures, in close collaboration with internal and external stakeholders, the quality of a joint provision that responds to societal challenges.

1. Vision on quality of education etc.
2. Involvement of all stakeholders
3. Challenge-based approach
4. QA policies for joint provision aligned with ESG



Stage of development

- Panel evaluates within context of the stage of development of the European University
- For each criterion what still needs/started to be developed, and partially/already developed
- Respecting timelines and choices made
- Findings and recommendations focus on how strengths and further development of internal QA can contribute to successful realisation of alliance's strategy and sustainability



Evaluation procedure: report

- Findings, analysis, conclusions regarding criteria, recommendations
- Confidential report with recommendations for further development
- Public summary

Pilot evaluations

- Evaluation of alliances, testing the Framework, and evaluation of pilots
- Online evaluations (instead of site visits-COVID measures) with 4 alliances and their stakeholders
- Alliances participating in the pilot evaluations:
 - EUTOPIA
 - UNA Europa
 - UNITE!
 - YUFE



Evaluation of the pilots

Elements of Framework	Evaluation of pilots	Implication for Framework
Criteria	Suitable but early days, especially for evaluation of Improvement Policy	Keep criteria but plan site visit preferably after setting up internal QA system
Reference points	Focused on long-term development; focus of alliance more on current EU project	Clarify long-term perspective; flexibility regarding reference points
Stage of development	Starting phase, different timelines (EU project, strategy 2025, 2050,...) can be confusing	Include first meeting between alliance and panel to clarify development stage of alliance and mutual expectations



Preliminary meeting (online)

Information provided to the panel (SER)

Composition of the panel (at least 5 trained experts)

Site visit (at 1 location for at least 2 days, involving partners and stakeholders)

Evaluation report (public, in English, collegiate advise)

Select at least one QA agency that is registered in the European Quality Assurance Register for Higher Education (EQAR)

Analysis by Resonance Group of proposed methodology

- Possible obstacles:
 - Unequal QA treatment of HEIs in or out of alliances (“lighter touch?”)
 - In some countries accreditations by a foreign EQAR-registered agency are not accepted
 - Procedures and accreditations must be in national language: translation from English
- Answer to question “Could the EUniQ framework be used in your country” varies according to legislation
- Relationship with European Approach for QA of Joint Programmes and QA of online learning/micro-credentials

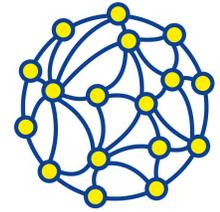


European Universities, legal frameworks, ESG: some recommendations by Resonance Group

- Focus on the level of the alliance
- Take the complete remit of each European University alliance into account
- Respect and strengthen Bologna key commitments
- Define a clear focus of the quality assurance process
- Facilitate collaborations and support trust among actors



Roadmap for the implementation of the **European Framework**



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Principles for implementing QA for European Universities

- Internal and external QA for European Universities compliant with ESG
- European University primary responsible for QA of its provision
- Evaluations of European Universities should respect internal QA, diversity, academic freedom and autonomy
- Evaluations should include all missions, respecting choices made
- Evaluations should focus on joint provision of alliance (not assessment of each HEI/programme/course)



Principles for implementing QA for European Universities

- Evaluation could support and simplify assessment with European Approach for QA of Joint Programmes
- Flexibility and openness in applying European Framework needed
- European Universities can choose 1, 2 or more EQAR-registered agencies
- National authorities to consider using evaluation results for national QA
- Ultimate aim is evaluation through 1 QA procedure with European Framework instead of multiple QA frameworks and procedures

Stakeholders involvement crucial for implementation of European Framework

- EQAR and QA agencies could give information on European Framework and experiences/approaches of agencies
- European Commission could co-fund more evaluations with European Framework and promote peer learning, also with initiatives of BFUG, ENQA, EQAR, NARIC Network
- QA agencies and European Universities could develop new projects to provide additional guidance and QA tools



Stakeholders involvement crucial for implementation of European Framework

- Evaluation results could inform national recognition authorities when making recognition decisions on European University qualifications (European Degree?)
- National authorities and QA agencies could consider how positive evaluation results according to European Framework can be used nationally to prevent multiple assessments of same joint provision
