Key challenges

- Centralised recognition system limits institutional autonomy
- Difficulties verifying foreign diplomas and accreditation
- Risks of fraudulent documents
- Administrative barriers (IIN, EDS, SIM requirements)
- Inconsistent practices across service centres

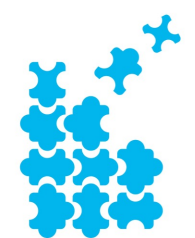
Key benefits

- Facilitates international student mobility
- Speeds up admission procedures
- Reduces administrative burden for universities
- Improves transparency and predictability
- Strengthens international trust and cooperation
- Effective in academic mobility (Learning agreements)
- Requires regulatory clarity and digital tools

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Netherlands: focus group on Automatic Recognition

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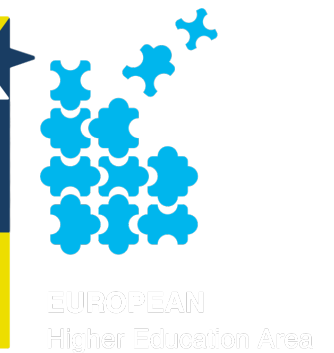


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Challenges at Dutch HEI

**AR is only known
by admissions
officers;**

**Difficult to reach
policy makers,
professors,

own institution;**

**Binary system of
Dutch HE is less
transparent for
many

not yet well-
developed.**



Benefits of AR at Dutch HEI

Consolidation of many years of de facto AR;

Consistency, transparency and efficiency;

NL being part of the multilateral agreement on AR;

Extension of the multilateral agreement with more countries.

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Automatic Recognition in San Marino

Automatic Recognition *ex lege*

- **Agreement on the mutual recognition of university degrees issued in the Republic of San Marino and the Italian Republic for the purpose of continuing studies (ratified in San Marino through Council Decree of 20/11/2011, n. 145 and in Italy through Law 07/02/2013 n. 15**



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Automatic Recognition in San Marino

Automatic Recognition *de facto*

- In the presence of complete documentation (diploma and diploma supplement), all academic qualifications awarded by a recognised higher education institution and belonging to a national higher education system within the European Higher Education Area are usually considered valid for the continuation of studies in San Marino.

N.B.

- Recognition is not admission
- Recognition prior verification of authenticity



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Recognition through application



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The validation or recognition of foreign studies and degrees for purposes related to:

- **the labour market or**
- **regulated professions**

is conducted through the assessment of documentation submitted by the applicant, attesting to the qualifications they have obtained

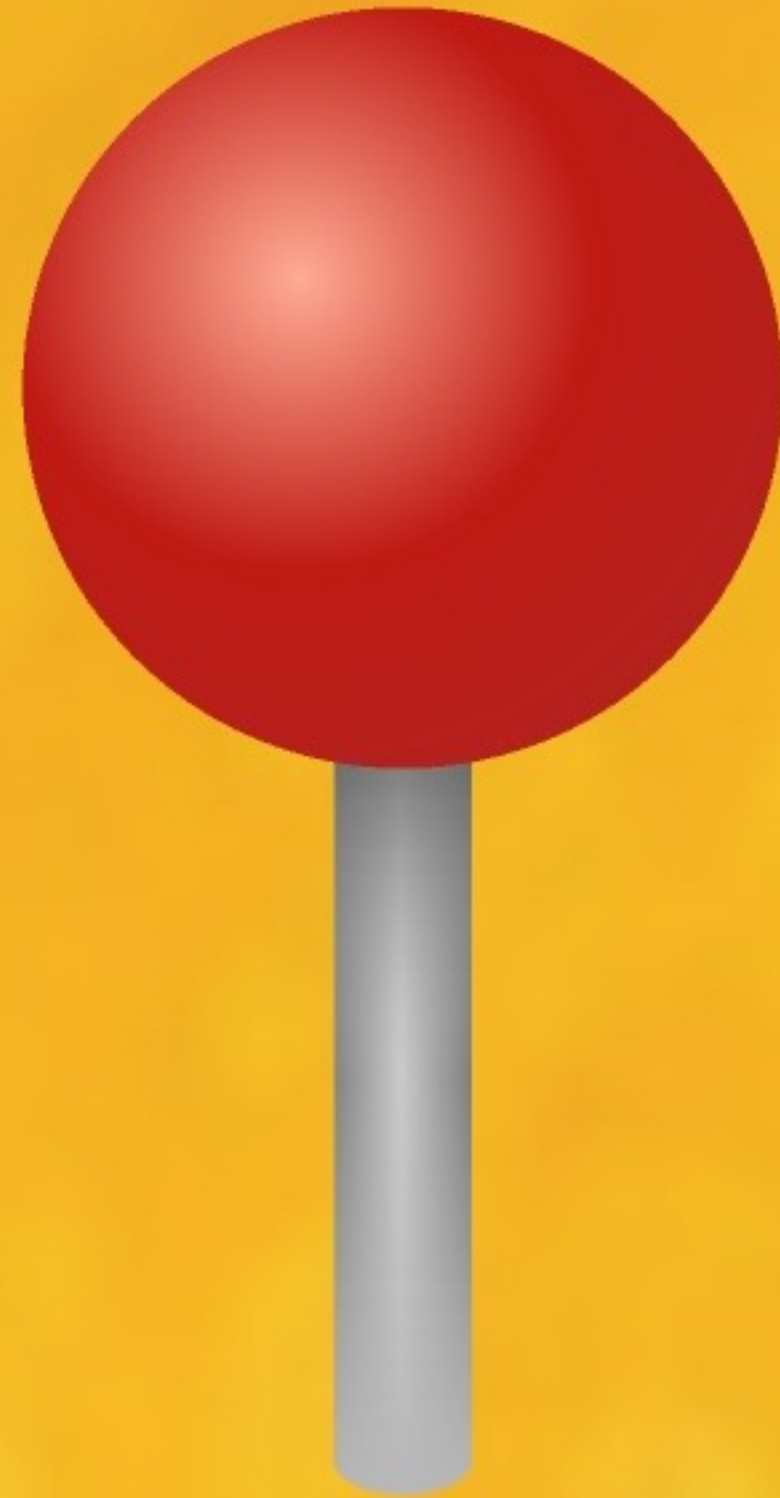

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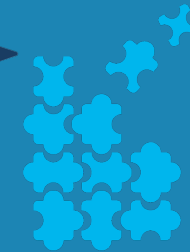
Ukraine: national focus group and Automatic Recognition
